Reflections on Te Reo lessons

- Lessons went well and were received positively by staff
- The Lessons built on from last years set of lessons, which helped to further the learning of student goals
- Lessons suffered some interruptions from COVID, but the slide presentation format allowed teachers to teach the lesson themselves if they so wished.
- Student engagement was high, the enthusiasm for the lessons was great
- Student retainment of knowledge from the previous year was fantastic
- Next step: for teachers to take what they have observed in the series of lessons and to teach the lessons independently

Any resources that are needed

- A second set of ti rakau (small sticks) to be used around the school (one set currently)
- A guitar for kapa haka use/waiata

Key points

- Both maths and writing have stayed very similar with the numbers at and above
- Both writing and reading are on par with whole school data. At/above in maths is less 7% than whole school
- The number of above students have decreased over the year
- The number of above students had the same decrease over the 2020-2021
- Reading has dropped at/above by 6%

Evaluation (where to next)?

- Identification of Maori students who are below
- Identify the areas that students are finding 'tricky' and look for common trends for teachers to address
- Teacher to continue teaching Te Reo lessons
- Continue to create a school that promotes student identity and sense of belonging through a localised curriculum
- Target Maori students to be identified in planning
- Continue to embed the Reo goal sheets
- Continue to develop our relationship with local iwi
- Links to the iwi in the opening of new build and the naming
